23	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
24	Section 1. (a) For purposes of this section, the
25	following terms shall have the following meanings:
26	(1) BUSINESS ENTITY. Any person or group of persons
27	employing one or more persons performing or engaging in any

activity, enterprise, profession, or occupation for gain, benefit, advantage, or livelihood, whether for profit or not for profit. The term includes, but is not limited to, self-employed individuals, business entities filing articles of incorporation, partnerships, limited partnerships, limited liability companies, foreign corporations, foreign limited partnerships, foreign limited liability companies authorized to transact business in this state, business trusts, and any business entity that registers with the Secretary of State.

- (2) CORONAVIRUS. Coronavirus disease 2019, commonly abbreviated "COVID-19."
- (3) PREMISES. Any building, structure, dwelling, or real property which may be entered or used by persons for business, public use, lodging, or the storage of goods, and includes any vehicle, aircraft, or watercraft used for the lodging of persons or carrying on of business.
- (b) Absent wanton, willful, or intentional conduct, a business entity that is properly licensed to conduct business in this state is not liable for any injury or damages, including death, suffered by any individual, resulting from the individual's actual or alleged contraction of the coronavirus from another patron, an employee, or any other individual while on the premises of the business entity.
- (c) A business entity that is not in compliance with any directive, order, or rule of the Alabama Department of Public Health or local health department, the Governor, or any other state or local entity relating to public health or a

declared state of emergency is not subject to the immunity 1 provided in subsection (a). 2 3 Section 2. The provisions of this act shall be retroactive to March 1, 2020. 4 Section 3. The provisions of this act are severable. 5 If any part of this act is declared invalid or 6 unconstitutional, that declaration shall not affect the part 7 which remains. Section 4. This act shall become effective 9 10 immediately following its passage and approval by the

Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.

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
