### **SELECTING THE VOTES**

The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the CPAC Foundation, is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area.

In 1971, ACUF launched its Ratings of Congress to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress. The Ratings quickly became considered the "gold standard" and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles.

In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, Ratings of the States grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers. Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America's federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31.

Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected.





## ALABAMA SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

### SB 9 Securing Future Elections with Paper Ballot Requirements.

This bill requires that electronic voter machines use paper ballots as a part of the process of tabulating votes. CPAC supports efforts to improve election integrity, supports efforts that make it easier to conduct audits of elections, and supported this bill. The Senate passed the initial version of this bill on April 4, 2023 by a vote of 29-0 and the bill later became law.

#### SB 175 Forcing Taxpayers to Pay for Other People's College Tuition.

This bill sets up a grant program that helps reimburse the costs of tuition for individuals aged 25 years or older. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to fund other people's college tuition and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on June 1, 2023 by a vote of 34-0 and the bill later became law.

#### SB 261 No Public Contracts for ESG-Obsessed Companies in Alabama.

This bill prohibits the government from entering into contracts with businesses that boycott energy or firearms companies. CPAC supports efforts to reduce the use of ESG standards in the state's decision-making processes and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 18, 2023 by a vote of 27-8 and the bill later became law.

#### SB 263 Substantial Improvements to Alabama's School Choice Programs.

This bill amends existing laws to allow kids in a family living at or below 250% of the federal poverty line to receive educational scholarships to attend a school that better suits their needs. It also expands the amount of money that may be awarded through such scholarships. While CPAC would prefer to see stronger school choice legislation, it nevertheless supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The Senate passed this bill on May 24, 2023 by a vote of 25-7 and the bill later became law.

#### **HB 6** Protecting Parental Rights in General in Alabama.

This bill recognizes the right of parents to direct the upbringing and education of their children. It then prohibits the government from interfering with this right. CPAC supports measures that promote the right of parents to guide their children through their early years and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 31, 2023 by a vote of 35-0 and the bill later became law.





## ALABAMA SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

### HB 241 Expanding Programs that Benefit Government-Favored Businesses.

This bill expands several programs that provide financial incentives to certain businesses. For example, it provides for a gradual increase of \$25,000,000 a year for five years on the cap for Alabama Jobs Act incentives. It also increases the annual cap on funds provided by the Growing Alabama Act to \$35,000,000. CPAC opposes government favoritism toward particular companies and opposed this bill. The Senate passed this bill on April 20, 2023 by a vote of 29-6 and the bill later became law.

### HB 261 Protecting Women's Sports in Alabama.

This bill prohibits public universities from allowing males to compete on sports teams designated as being for females. CPAC supports efforts to create a safe and fair environment of play in college sports and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 3, 2023 by a vote of 26-4 and the bill later became law.

#### HB 379 No Alabaman Agricultural Land for Foreign Governments.

This bill prohibits the governments of China, Iran, North Korea, and Russia from acquiring a controlling interest in agricultural land within the state or any land within 10 miles of a military installation. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to further the US' security interests and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 18, 2023 by a vote of 26-7 and the bill later became law.

### HB 479 Halving Alabama's Grocery Tax Over Time.

This bill reduces Alabama's grocery tax from 4% to 2% over the next couple of years. While CPAC would prefer to see stronger tax reductions, it still recognizes the importance of this legislation for Alabama and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on June 1, 2023 by a vote of 30-0 and the bill later became law.

## ALABAMA HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

### SB 9 Securing Future Elections with Paper Ballot Requirements.

This bill requires that electronic voter machines use paper ballots as a part of the process of tabulating votes. The House passed the initial version of this bill on May 2, 2023 by a vote of 78-27 and the bill later became law.

### SB 175 Forcing Taxpayers to Pay for Other People's College Tuition.

CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to fund other people's college tuition and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on June 1, 2023 by a vote of 102-0 and the bill later became law.

### SB 261 No Public Contracts for ESG-Obsessed Companies in Alabama.

This bill prohibits the government from entering into contracts with businesses that boycott energy or firearms companies. CPAC supports efforts to reduce the use of ESG standards in the state's decision-making processes and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 31, 2023 by a vote of 74-27 and the bill later became law.

#### SB 263 Substantial Improvements to Alabama's School Choice Programs.

This bill amends existing laws to allow kids in a family living at or below 250% of the federal poverty line to receive educational scholarships to attend a school that better suits their needs. It also expands the amount of money that may be awarded through such scholarships. While CPAC would prefer to see stronger school choice legislation, it nevertheless supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The Senate passed this bill on May 31, 2023 by a vote of 73-22 and the bill later became law.

### **HB 6** Protecting Parental Rights in General in Alabama.

This bill recognizes the right of parents to direct the upbringing and education of their children. It then prohibits the government from interfering with this right. CPAC supports measures that promote the right of parents to guide their children through their early years and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on May 24, 2023 by a vote of 87-8 and the bill later became law.





## ALABAMA HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

#### **HB 209** Prohibiting Certain Forms of Ballot Harvesting.

This bill prohibits individuals from distributing or collecting absentee ballots and their associated applications. CPAC recognizes that ballot harvesting is a gateway to election fraud, supports efforts to restrict and prohibit its practice, and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on May 4, 2023 by a vote of 76–28 but the bill stalled in the Senate.

### HB 241 Expanding Programs that Benefit Government-Favored Businesses.

This bill expands several programs that provide financial incentives to certain businesses. For example, it provides for a gradual increase of \$25,000,000 a year for five years on the cap for Alabama Jobs Act incentives. It also increases the annual cap on funds provided by the Growing Alabama Act to \$35,000,000. CPAC opposes government favoritism toward particular companies over others and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on April 13, 2023 by a vote of 105-0 and the bill later became law.

### HB 261 Protecting Women's Sports in Alabama.

This bill prohibits public universities from allowing males to compete on sports teams designated as being for females. CPAC supports efforts to create a safe and fair environment of play in college sports and supported this bill. The Senate passed this bill on May 24, 2023 by a vote of 93-4 and the bill later became law.

#### HB 334 Attempt to Promote School Choice in Alabama.

This bill sets up scholarship education accounts for certain disadvantaged students such that their parents may enroll them in an educational program that best suits their needs. While CPAC would prefer to see a more expansive school choice bill from the legislature, it still supports school choice and supported this bill as a step in the right direction. The House passed this bill on May 11, 2023 by a vote of 99-5 but the bill stalled in the Senate.

#### **HB 379** No Alabaman Agricultural Land for Foreign Governments.

This bill prohibits the governments of China, Iran, North Korea, and Russia from acquiring a controlling interest in agricultural land within the state or any land within 10 miles of a military installation. CPAC supports appropriate efforts to further the US' security interests and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on May 9, 2023 by a vote of 73-23 and the bill later became law.





## ALABAMA HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

### **HB 429** Subsidizing Virtual Reality.

This bill expands the types of industries that may receive financial incentives from the government to include entertainment companies that create virtual reality content. It also expands the amount of rebates and incentives that an individual company may receive. CPAC does not believe that taxpayers should be forced to subsidize the production of virtual reality content and opposed this bill. The House passed this bill on May 23, 2023 by a vote of 100-1 and the bill later became law.

#### HB 479 Halving Alabama's Grocery Tax Over Time.

This bill reduces Alabama's grocery tax from 4% to 2% over the next couple of years. While CPAC would prefer to see stronger tax reductions, it still recognizes the importance of this legislation for Alabama and supported this bill. The House passed this bill on June 1, 2023 by a vote of 101-0 and the bill later became law.
